### 20 Hour Responsible Adult for Child Care Training Course



This course meets the required 20 hours training for "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers child development, guiding behaviour, health, safety, nutrition and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have video and audio capabilities, and participate and attend all sessions to receive certification.

#### To sign up for this course participants must:

- Be 19 years of age
- Have minimum Grade 8 English written and oral skills
- Attend all scheduled sessions

### Once the training is complete, participants are eligible to work as a Responsible Adult in:

- School-age Child Care Programs
- Licensed Family Child Care
- Registered License-Not-Required Child Care
- As additional support or substitute in Licensed Preschool and Licensed Child Care Programs
- Summer Camps

#### What Brain Research Tells Us About Learning and Behaviour

#### This workshop will:

- Examine the main findings on brain development, age related differences, and acculturation of youth.
- Examine strategies to use when working with youth based on brain research.
- Look through the lens of gender when considering the needs of both boys and girls.

Not all boys are the same or girls all the same, but research indicates there are some generalities that are worth considering. Questions we will consider include:

- Females can speak up to 10 times as many words in a day as males how come?
- 70% of learning and behavioural disability designations are boys- what does this tell us?
- Are girls emotionally stronger than boys?
- What is the best way to deal with a boy who is upset? A girl who is upset?

Bruce has been an educator for over 45 years, including 34 years in the public school system as teacher, principal and Assistant Superintendent, and 11 years preparing future teachers in the School of Education at Trinity Western University. Bruce has a wealth of experience presenting to large and small organizations on a variety of topics, as well as presenting over 85 workshops throughout North America on positive youth development.

Métis Nation British Columbia Ministry of Education and Child Care presents a workshop in understanding, identifying, and supporting Métis children and culture in early years programming. Through an interactive workshop, facilitators will share information on Métis history and culture in Canada. Understanding who Métis are, and ways individuals can connect. Through cultural resources, facilitators will demonstrate how to incorporate cultural items into early years programs and activities, to ensure children learn more about the Métis culture. Métis children and families will begin to see themselves reflected in the programming provided within their community. Throughout the workshop participants and facilitators will encompass and reflect on the Métis core values while engaging in an interactive workshop that focuses on relationships, connectivity and collaboration of knowledge and learning.

Pawandeep has worked with children and families in the Early Childhood Education field for 12 years. #### **Promoting Self-Regulation with the Bottom-up Approach**

Research has shown that self-regulation is one of the key life skills related to learning as well as emotional, social, and physical well-being. From taking turns to expressing their big emotions appropriately, infants and toddlers require much learning, practice, and support from early childhood educators.

During this workshop, early childhood educators will be introduced to their crucial role as co-regulators while discussing the development of regulation. They will explore different strategies to meet an individual child's needs based on tackling different levels of the brain.

Dr. Minnie Mossop is a passionate infant and toddler specialist with a Ph.D. and MA in Infant and Early Childhood Development and an M.Ed. in Early Childhood Education. Her research interests cover various mental health areas (e.g., attachment, brain development, co-regulation) of young children, especially infants and toddlers. She is a faculty member of the Early Childhood Education Program at Douglas College. She has also supported hundreds of families and ECEs in North America through online/offline consultations and group workshops.

#### **Unswaddling Pedagogy: Celebrating Strengths and Differences**

Presenter: Dr. Annabella Cant

In very practical, joyful, playful ways, the workshop will engage with the concepts and practices of swaddling, unswaddling and non-swaddling pedagogies, bringing into the attention of the audience the pivotal role of early education in the designs of life. The presentation will also focus on the "missing beginnings"- the reasons why there is a globally present disconnect between early education and school education. Dr. Annabella Cant will share findings from her research in order to motivate the audience to think with the concepts and better understand the privilege of working with young children. She will continue the conversation on the introduced concepts in and will share two examples of swaddling pedagogies: the "Moulding" one and the "Not-yet" one. Also, she will introduce the theory and practice of Imaginative Education – a pedagogy that she considers close to being unswaddling – together with her own contributions to it, contributions that emphasize the period at the beginning of life: 0 to 5. Participants will get a glimpse of children's genuine capacity for openness and wonder by feeling it themselves. Annabella will remind her participants how to be joyful, playful, and open, and why these states of mind provoke deep and long-lasting learning in children.

Dr. Annabella Cant is a professor in Early Childhood Education at Capilano University and sessional instructor of the Master of Education in Imaginative Education at Simon Fraser University. Annabella received the 2019 Teaching Excellence Award from her university. She is also an invited keynote speaker to many ECCE conferences and events. Annabella is member of the Academic Council of the Centre for Imagination in Research, Culture, and Education. She is also the initiator and editor-in-chief of the online journal: Childhoods and Pedagogies. She has been practicing ECCE since 1994; in 1999 she started opening her own child care centres in Europe (her schools were dedicated to children with very diverse backgrounds and abilities). She collaborated with a number of orphanages and organizations and welcomed all children. Her newest publication, Unswaddling Pedagogy (2017), is a book for educators and parents. Her new pedagogical lens—the unswaddling pedagogy—is inspired and fueled by the stories she has lived. Her passions are her family + puppy, running, and creating an inclusive world.

#### Kids Yoga for All Abilities Presenter: Karen LeSage

This workshop looks at understanding the challenging behaviours of children. Shifting our perspective to what is being communicated through challenging behaviour allows us to embrace more positive and pro-active strategies in addressing it.

Perfect for centres with children expressing challenging behaviours, returning to care after an extended break due to the pandemic, and school-age centres as children readjust to school and their new normal. This workshop focuses on school-aged children but can be applied to children of all ages.

Cris has been a teacher with the Vancouver School Board since 2012. He is currently a District Resource Teacher focused on collaborating with schools to support students with challenging behaviours.
