Think back to your own childhood -- for most of us, nature was a prominent learning feature in our lives. It promoted our creativity and forced us to figure out the world that surrounded us. From using sticks as swords and magic wands or playing hide-and-seek behind trees, the outdoors provided us endless play opportunities.

Not only does research show that spending time outside is necessary, but it is also agreed upon by many researchers that children who spend more time in nature are happier, have higher attention spans and are less likely to develop anxiety.

Connecting children with nature is critical. It helps foster creativity, assist in developing problem-solving skills, and has many physical benefits – including exercise and spatial awareness.

As a caregiver, and an important part of a child's life, think how you might offer children the opportunity for a unique play and learning experiences this summer. How can use the outdoors to give children the opportunity to succeed, and to develop their confidence and self-esteem?

“Children develop a sense of place when they connect with their local communities and outdoor environment. Early learning is “of a place” when children and educators engage with local histories with respectful curiosity and a desire to contribute and share. Indigenous peoples have been the knowledge keepers of these places for hundreds of generations. Indigenous languages are some of the voices of these places.” (British Columbia Early Learning Framework pg., 21)

### Scavenger Hunt

Go on a Scavenger Hunt! Provide magnifying glasses, plastic tweezers and a container. Invite children to start a nature collection by gathering items that have fallen on the ground. Pinecones, bark, leaves, sticks, and small stones are all great examples of found, loose parts that can be used in nature crafts and play.

### Nature Art

There are endless ways children can use natural materials to make art that is colorful, textural, and even environmentally friendly. As an added bonus, it's all free! Such connections with nature give children a break from today's digital lifestyle and helps supports the development of their fine motor skills, critical thinking and creativity.
