20 Hour Responsible Adult for Child Care Training Course



This course meets the requirements of 20 hours training to become a "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers child development, guiding behaviour, health, safety, nutrition and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have video and audio capabilities, as well as participate and attend all sessions in order to receive the certification at the end of the course.

To sign up for this course participants must:

- Be 19 years of age
- Have minimum Grade 8 English written and oral skills
- Attend all scheduled sessions

Once the training is complete, participants are eligible to work as a Responsible Adult in:

- School-age Child Care Programs
- Licensed Family Child Care
- Registered License-Not-Required Child Care
- As additional support or substitute in Licensed Preschool and Licensed Child Care Programs
- Summer Camps

Would you like to learn more about Inquiry Based Learning? In this workshop we will take a deep dive into projects that were ignited by the curiosities of children which ignited long term investigations. Whether you refer to it as Responsive, Emergent Curriculum or Inquiry Based Learning, join us to discover how authentic inquiry has potential to evolve into a long term projects.

Goal: Demonstrate the multiple ways children learn when their interests are sparked from their authentic inquiries.

Sue Woodward and Caren Eigenmann are the co-owners of Childgarden Preschool & Discoveries in Port Moody, BC, which opened in 2007. Our image of the child aligns with one of the underlying principles of Reggio Emilia, in which we see the child as 'rich in potential, strong, powerful, competent, and most of all connected to adults and other children' (Malaguzzi, 1993, p. 10). Educators work alongside the children and their natural curiosity to observe and develop in-depth investigations that reflect and are built upon authentic interests of the children, making their preschool experience fun, exciting and relevant to them and their world. Educators extend and expand these interests to create deep, meaningful learning opportunities which lay the foundation for future learning. Both Sue and Caren are recipients of the Prime Minister's Award of Excellence in Early Childhood Education, in 2012 and 2017 respectively.

Understanding Behaviour in School Age Children

This workshop looks at understanding the challenging behaviours of children. Shifting our perspective to what is being communicated through challenging behaviour allows us to embrace more positive and pro-active strategies in addressing it.

Perfect for centres with children expressing challenging behaviours, returning to care after an extended break due to the pandemic, and school-age centres as children readjust to school and their new normal. This workshop focuses on school-aged children but can be applied to children of all ages.

Cris Janicas has been a teacher with the Vancouver School Board since 2012. He is currently a District Resource Teacher focused on collaborating with schools to support students with challenging behaviours. He earned his Bachelor of Education from SFU and completed recent graduate programs focused on arts and health & physical education. He has been married for 14 years and has two sons.

Learning to Keep Your Sense of Humour on Tough Days

This workshop is based on a humour Training Program called The 7 humour Habits Program. It has been successfully tested in four countries (Switzerland, Germany and Australia—as well as the USA). There is also a Japanese translation of the book containing the Training now available in Japan. The Training is contained in Paul's book, humour as Survival Training for a Stressed-Out world: The 7 humour Habits Program. The focus of this Training is to first get a better understanding of your own sense of humour, and then practice the 7 key humour habits, with the ultimate goal of keeping your sense of humour on high-stress days; i.e., learning to use humour to cope with life stress—both in your work with young children and elsewhere in daily life.

Dr. Paul Mcghee is a developmental psychologist who spent 20 years teaching at the university level before quitting his academic job to become a full-time professional speaker. Paul has published 5 books and many scientific articles on children's humour and is internationally known for his own research in the area. Paul has received lifetime achievement awards from a) the International Society for humour Studies, b) Oakland University and c) the Association for Applied and Therapeutic humour for both his basic research on humour and laughter and work on practical daily applications of humour.

Media Technology in Early Childhood: Growing Up Mobile

This workshop presents research data regarding young children's direct and indirect exposure to and engagement with media and electronic-based toys and learning tools. Actual and potential impacts on early development and learning processes are addressed. Here are the following areas we will discuss:

- Change and growth in technology, including mobile devices
- Child use of technology
- Developmental changes in capacities for child use of technology (birth to school age)
- Benefits & risks for children (birth to school age)
- Role of adults as mediators
- Use guidelines by age

Since completing a PhD in Human Development, Learning and Culture (UBC, 2016), Michaela has been working as an adjunct professor in the Early Childhood Education department at UBC and have consulted to the early intervention services field (IDP/AIDP/SCD/ASCD) on developmental assessment practices. Michaela's research interests have focused on the role of emerging digital technologies as a new context for infant and toddler development. The first conference presentation on the topic ("Electronic Childhood") was in 2006! Her 2010 Thesis compared the quality of parent-child interaction with electronic and non-electronic toys, while her 2016 Doctoral dissertation examined factors that predicted the provision and use of mobile digital devices by infants and toddlers. Michaela's earlier 3-decade career was comprised of working as a home visitor, supervisor, and peer instructor in the B.C. Infant Development Program, as a college instructor for two postbasic ECCE programs, and as a teaching assistant in UBC's teacher education program.
