BC Gov News - Child care savings make returning to school more affordable for more B.C. families: "Starting Sept. 1, 2023, families with children in eligible half-day preschool and before- and after-school programs will save as much as an additional \$145 per child, per month. The Province is providing the funding directly to participating child care centres so families do not need to apply to receive the savings."

BC Gov News - Grants will help international, francophone educators join child care sector: Early childhood professionals educated in languages other than English will have reduced costs and more support to become certified to work in British Columbia's child care sector, as a result of financial support to translate educational documents into English.

The Early Learning Resource Library acknowledges the importance of building stronger and respectful relationships with Indigenous Peoples. Our collection of resources encourage conversations that address cultural sensitivity while fostering a sense of empathy with Indigenous communities.



15005 Bald Eagle

This wooden life-size replica of an eagle's egg promotes visual and tactile exploration for children. It sparks children and educator's curiosity and interest. Have a conversation with children about what they represent and how they can be used as a tool to promote peace, empathy, and understanding.



08729 Sharing Our world

Discover animals of the Northwest Coast through books and puppets! Share with young children a little ancestral wisdom about wild animals and how we can respect their habitats. It may instill respect and inspire children to think critically about the wildlife we share our land with.

31192 Phyllis's Orange Shirt

Present the story in a sensitive and age-appropriate manner to discuss the importance of kindness and empathy. Engage children with questions such as: "How do you think Phyllis felt when she had to change her shirt?", "Why do you think Phyllis loved her orange shirt?"



23603 Lub Drum! Lub Drum!

Have you heard the heartbeat of Mother Earth? If not, it is time to strike the drum. Incorporate rhythmic sounds into your program. Allow every beat to be heard and felt by children. (Additional resource: Early Years Indigenous Cultural Safety Resource Guide)













ARTICLES OF INTEREST

Comox Valley Record - LETTER - Early childhood educators are not paid what they are worth: "... Early childhood educators are so poorly paid for the work they do. The average salary in BC is about \$22 an hour, much closer to the wage of a fast-food worker than that of a public school teacher. The work of an ECE is complex and difficult, both intellectually and emotionally. We will never attract enough people to the field until we address this disconnect between responsibility and compensation."



Children First Canada - Kids in Canada Face a Polycrisis: "Raising Canada 2023 is the sixth in an annual series of reports that track the top 10 threats to childhood. This year, the report highlights how children and youth have compounded, complex, and urgent needs in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic and the recent "tripledemic". The data also reveals that equitydeserving children and youth are disproportionately impacted by the top 10 threats - including young First Nations, Métis and Inuit children, people from racialized communities, 2SLGBTQIA+ youth and young people with disabilities."

Vancouver Sun - \$4.3M spike in Vancouver child-care centre's construction costs a sign of the times: "The current economic climate means the City of Vancouver, and many municipal councils, will face tough decisions during this year's budget deliberations... the war in Ukraine, COVID-19, labour shortages, high interest rates and even regional flooding are being cited as reasons why [construction costs are increasing]."
