SUN SAFE KIDS: PROTECTING CHILDREN FROM UV EXPOSURE

Wednesday, July 9th, 2025 • 7:00-9:00PM • Coquitlam CCRR • 1130C Austin Avenue • Fee: \$5.00 • Suitable for child care providers, child care workforce, and parents.

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in Canada and rates continue to rise. Children are particularly vulnerable to the damaging effects of UV radiation, but the good news is that skin cancer is largely preventable. This workshop will provide the latest information on sun safety and explain why protecting children from the harmful effects of the sun is so important. Participants will learn evidence-based sun safe practices to incorporate into daily routines and policies at their childcare centres.

Presenters: Isabella Piechota & Melissa Yan (BC Cancer Prevention)

Isabella Piechota and Melissa Yan are Promotion Specialists with BC Cancer's health promotion team, both holding Master's Degrees in Public Health. They develop evidencebased educational resources to engage diverse communities and healthcare providers across British Columbia in cancer prevention and screening initiatives. Through partnerships with community organizations and collaboration with healthcare providers, they work to empower British Columbians through cancer prevention and screening education to enable themselves and others to take control and improve their health.





BALANCED SNACKS AND LUNCHES FOR SCHOOL AND CHILD CARE

THE CAPABLE AND CONFIDENT INFANT (RIE)

The Capable and Confident Infant is inspired by the work of Magda Gerber and the respect-based principles of the RIE approach. Participants will explore the idea of seeing infants as intelligent participators in their day and consider how slowing down our 1-to-1 caregiving actions and calmly managing play environments can impact their learning. This workshop includes a mix of presentation, group discussion and role-play.

Presenter: Alicia Kirlik

Alicia has been an Early Childhood Educator since 2011. She has worked in variety of programs including infant toddler, preschool, 3-5 group care, and school-aged care. In the summer of 2019 Alicia completed the first ever Vancouver RIE® Foundations training and sees the RIE teachings as a much needed bridge between parenting and the ECE world.





POLYVAGAL-INFORMED TEACHING: PRACTICAL STRATEGIES FOR CO-REGULATION AND CONNECTION IN EARLY CHILDHOOD CLASSROOMS

Building on the principles of Polyvagal Theory, this workshop focuses on practical, Polyvagal-informed strategies for creating emotionally supportive and engaging early childhood classrooms. Participants will explore the critical role of co-regulation—the process through which educators support children's nervous system states—and learn how to foster safety, connection, and resilience.

Participants will:

- Discover practical strategies to support children's co-regulation and nervous system states.
- Learn how to create classroom environments that nurture co-regulation and emotional well-being.
- Gain actionable insights on fostering a sense of safety and belonging in every classroom interaction.

Presenter: Julia Black

Julia Black is the Coordinator and an Instructor in the Early Childhood Care and Education Program in the School of Education and Childhood Studies at Capilano University. Julia has been a part of the Capilano University community since 2007. She has worked as an educator and executive director in early childhood programs throughout the Sea to Sky corridor and as an educational and early years policy consultant.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES WITH EMOTIONAL AND MENTAL HEALTH CHALLENGES: UNDERSTANDING THE IMPACT ON YOUNG CHILDREN

This workshop explores how a family's emotional well-being and mental health challenges can impact a young child's development, sense of identity, and behavior. We will discuss practical, compassionate strategies for building trusting relationships with families, supporting children who may be navigating these complexities, and creating inclusive environments that promote resilience and emotional regulation. This session will also include reflective dialogue, real-world scenarios, and time for discussion.

Presenter: Negar Kaviani

Negar Kaviani is a faculty member in the Early Childhood Education department at Langara College, with over 16 years of experience working with children and families as an ECE. Her work is deeply rooted in the values of relationships, inclusion, and resilience-building, and is informed by developmental psychology, trauma-informed practices, and a commitment to equity and inclusion. In addition to her academic role, Negar has worked extensively as both a parent coach and a Behavioral Interventionist (BI), supporting children with diverse needs and helping families navigate complex emotional and behavioral challenges. She brings a grounded, compassionate lens to conversations around child development and educator-family relationships.





HELPING CHILDREN THRIVE THROUGH LIFE TRANSITIONS AND "TOUGH STUFF"

What is tough stuff for young children? Sharing, sitting at circle time, and putting on shoes to go outside can seem challenging for some little bodies. Now imagine being a little one whose parents are struggling to put food on the table, or a child who recently moved or just had a younger sibling born. Now add to these daily struggles and life transitions, the impact of going through a pandemic for most of your life. That is exactly what our 3-5 years olds are going through right now. Not only are many children facing an increased risk for adversity, but many may also be going through their daily lives with additional stress and trauma that could be impacting their ability to participate in regular childcare routines without us knowing. In this workshop, participants will go through common and not-so-common challenges children may face. Participants will also discuss how the childcare environment and curriculum may impact children who are dealing with tough stuff at home. Participants will also be given strategies that are inclusive and trauma-informed to best support all children.

Presenter: Ana Valle Rivera

Ana is a proud mother of three, a public speaker, a consultant, and the founder of Early Years Thriving. Since 2007 Ana has worked with diverse children and families with complex needs using inclusive and trauma-informed approaches. Ana has a background in ECE, a Bachelor's Degree in Child & Youth Care, and is currently completing a Master's Degree in Professional Education in ECE.

CREATING CALM AND COMMUNITY: THE POWER OF ENVIRONMENT AND SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING IN CHILD CARE

Kim Barthel is an occupational therapist, speaker, mentor, and best-selling author dedicated to supporting individuals globally. She focuses on neurobiology, complex behavior, trauma-sensitive practices, sensory processing, attachment, and mental health. In 2019, she received the Award of Merit from the Canadian Association of Occupational Therapy. In today's diverse child care settings, this 5-hour workshop aims to empower educators to adopt a mindset of curiosity, compassion, and neurodiverse-affirming practices. It emphasizes understanding children's behaviors as communications rather than problems. Participants, including educators and support workers, will learn to become "behavioral detectives," fostering holistic and inclusive approaches that celebrate individuality and build strong relationships, while addressing both neurodivergent and neurotypical development.

Practical strategies can foster resilience and belonging by understanding children's behaviors as communications rather than problems. Child care educators and support workers will act as "behavioral detectives," using a holistic, inclusive approach that celebrates individuality and builds strong relationships. They will learn to address both neurodivergent and neurotypical development without relying on labels or diagnoses.

Participants in this workshop will learn to:

- Value neurodiverse-affirming practices
- Identify neurobiology behind "challenging" behaviors
- Differentiate sensory, emotional, and cognitive behavior components
- Explain effects of developmental trauma and attachment patterns Support regulation and social engagement

RESPONSIBLE ADULT: 20 HOUR CHILD CARE TRAINING COURSE

Monday, September 15th, 2025 - Friday, September 26th, 2025 (weekdays) • 10:00AM-12:00PM • Online • Fee: \$20.00 • Suitable for child care providers and child care workforce.

This course fulfills the 20-hour training requirement to become a "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulations. The content covers topics such as child development, behaviour, health, safety, nutrition, and programming. The course is live and interactive, so participants must have both video and audio capabilities.

Participants are required to: be at least 19 years old at the time of registration, demonstrate Grade 8 proficiency in both written and spoken English (or an equivalent level) to engage actively in class, and attend all sessions to earn a certificate of completion.

Upon successfully completing this course, participants will be qualified to work as a Responsible Adult in various environments, including School-age Child Care Programs, Licensed Family Child Care, as additional support or substitutes in Licensed Preschool and Child Care Programs, as well as Summer Camps.

WORKING EFFECTIVELY IN MULTICULTURAL AND MULTI-CARE TEAMS IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (4 DAY COURSE)

This course will equip early childhood educators to work more effectively within multicultural and multi-care teams, including therapists and paraprofessionals. It focuses on understanding team roles, navigating differences in professional perspectives, and enhancing communication. Educators will explore strategies for culturally responsive practice, conflict resolution, and advocating for their professional insights. This workshop series emphasizes the educator's role in coordinating care, fostering collaboration, and supporting childcentered, inclusive approaches in team settings. This is an interactive and highly participatory workshop series, so come prepared to share and learn together.

PATHOLOGICAL DEMAND AVOIDANCE (PDA)

This is a relatively new term for a profile of traits under the Autism umbrella. Autistic children often need extra support when processing requests or demands especially for things that may be unfamiliar. Those with a PDA profile experience severe anxiety over similar situations but also include everyday 'demands' such as hygiene, eating, dressing, and attending school. Parents and educators often hear "I can't" and interpret it as "I won't". Let's see what is really happening for these children, why they respond as they do and how we can support them.

Presenter: Pam Collins

Pam Collins is a late-identified neurodivergent parent of two amazing multiple neurodivergent adult sons. She provides Neurodiverse-Affirming parent coaching, consulting and education services to families and community partners and has been supporting families for over 25 years.





INDIGENOUS RESOURCES, INDIGENOUS PEDAGOGIES AND RELATIONSHIPS! OH MY!

As an early childhood educator, you might be the first point of contact for many Indigenous families who are entering an educational setting for the very first time. You play a critical role. It's a big responsibility and it is also a gift!

In this workshop, we will explore the following key themes:

- Where can I find authentic Indigenous resources that celebrate and reflect the diversity of Indigenous communities throughout Canada? How can I use them effectively?
- How can I use Indigenous pedagogies like storytelling, circle, land-based teachings in my program? Can I use a drum if I am not Indigenous?
- What is an elder/knowledge keeper and how can I invite them to visit my program?
- What are best practices for connecting and building strong relationships with Indigenous families?

You will leave this session understanding that you are already doing so many things right and more importantly, you'll leave with ideas that you can start using right away.

Presenter: Nadine McSpadden

Nadine McSpadden is a retired teacher with over 22 years of experience in Indigenous education. She is a proud member of the Secwepemc Nation and currently serves as a Faculty Associate at UBC. Nadine also works as a consultant with Len Pierre Consulting and partners with WildCraft Dyeing to offer workshops on natural dyeing, grounded in Indigenous ways of knowing and being. She is a passionate advocate for embedding Indigenous perspectives into education, and her work reflects a deep respect for culture, community, and land.



NETWORKING: BENEFITS OF FELT STORIES MAKE & TAKE


